aving grown up in a farmhouse, it was always Barbara's dream to go back to that style of living.

When she and husband David learned that a vacant 1789 stucco-clad stone farmhouse (complete with a large walk-in fireplace, a beehive bread oven, 18" thick walls with deep window sills) was for sale on 46 acres that included a pond and a tree-lined lane, it was too good to be true. So what if a friend candidly described the house as "uninhabitable".

Not only did this property provide Barbara with an opportunity to fulfill her dreams of farmhouse living, it would also give the couple the challenge of

preserving a historic relic while creating a very comfortable, contemporary, energy-efficient and very attractive home. They both recognized the immense potential and decided to go for it. The year was 1992.

In addition to the poor condition of the original stone home, there was also an out-of-place looking 1960's vintage ranch-style addition attached to the back. Eventually it would need to go, but the immediate priority was removing the stucco and repointing the stone, installing new windows, a kitchen and furnace.

Years went by before the couple finally decided to move on their plans to

create their dream home. According to Barbara, "it took us 30 years to figure out a sympathetic addition that blended with the historic home that could provide us the space for a new kitchen, great room, large master suite, laundry and office". They had by this time collected alot of ideas and photos of what they wanted-it was now time to find a contractor to help make it happen.

As luck would have it, they stumbled upon Kent Nolt and his team at LH Construction (LHC) who were working on a nearby stone home remodel. They liked what they saw and they definitely liked what they heard upon a meeting. In short, both agreed that

they found the right contractor to see them through.

Prior to constructing the main addition (right), the first phase of the project was a spacious sunroom addition as seen above. As evidenced by the photos, LHC did a beautiful job in blending both additions to the original stone home. As for the interior work, the happy homeowners now have all the cozy comforts of a very attractive contemporary home. Equally gratifying is the preservation work the couple accomplished in bringing the historic farmhouse back to its original classic beauty.





In preparation for the new addition, an unsightly 1960's ranchstyle addition attached to the farmhouse was removed down to the foundation. The square footage of the new addition


remained the same with the exception of additional space for the dining bay and foyer. With the slope of the yard, it took 56 tri-axle truckloads of backfill to level the property.
