

ollowers of R&A Magazine may remember this edition's featured builder—L.H. Construction of Leola—from our Fall 2013 cover story entitled The NeverEnding Project. Those with really good memories will recall that The NeverEnding Project was just that...never ending. Or so it seemed. As the project went on, the happy homeowners kept increasing the scope of work, extending the project, time and time again. Not so this time.

Not only did this project have a very definitive scope of

work, it had a VERY tight time frame in which to complete it. Homeowners Wendell and Julie, having already outgrown their modest 1,200 square foot, 1940's vintage Cape Cod, desperately needed more space for their family of 5. And with a baby on the way and due in 5 months, they needed things done in a hurry.

Although they briefly looked at the option of purchasing a larger home, they both liked the area that they were in as well as their property which sat on a large corner lot. And having lived in their home since its purchase in 2004, they

Scope:	The homeowners were expecting another baby and they desperately needed more space. While they briefly considered moving to a larger home, they really loved their location as well as having a corner property and all its acreage. In the end, they decided to commission L.H. Construction to design and build a three-story addition to their Cape Cod home.
	In the design discussions, the homeowners stressed their desire to have the addition blend into and complement the existing architecture. What they didn't want was an addition that looked like a box that was added on.
	Included in the addition's first floor were a new living room, dining room, and a kitchen with granite counter tops that opened up into the existing portion of the home. Three bedrooms were added upstairs, along with a walk-in closet, and a bathroom. A large unfinished daylight basement provides storage and also houses the laundry as well as the HVAC mechanicals.
	On the exterior, a new roof and siding were installed on the entire home. A front porch was added to the original home along with two dormers above it.
	In addition to the homeowner's aesthetic desires, they were also focused on incorporating energy-efficiency measures that included upgraded insulation throughout the home and a state-of-the-art geothermal heat-pump system.
	Despite a period of noise and inconvenience (the family lived on site throughout the project), this home expansion project provided the space so desperately needed and avoided the turmoil and disruption inherent in relocating.

weren't all that keen on disrupting their family by starting over in a new location.

While additional space was the primary motivating factor, it was also important to Wendell and Julie that the addition fit in with the look of the Cape Cod so that it looked like it belonged there—rather than an obvious add on. As for the space requirements, they wanted at least 2 more bedrooms, another bath, a new and expanded kitchen, as well as more living space for family activities.

As for the selection of a General Contractor to coordinate the project, they had personal connections to L.H. Construction and didn't feel the need to look any further. According to Wendell, the decision was easy. "I grew up with the founders of LHC so





Not counting the basement, the home's livable space as a result of the addition, increased by approximately 1,600 square feet.

I knew they would be fair and honest with us. I was also familiar with their work ethic and workmanship which is top drawer impeccable. It was simply a matter of timing—could they fit us into their schedule and would they be able to meet our tight time frame?"

They did and they did...on both issues.

Starting in January, and with the baby due in mid to late June, L.H. Construction made the commitment to put the project on a fast track. They made some scheduling adjustments, got a commitment from their team, and proceeded to make it happen. Plans were developed and finalized, necessary permits were obtained, and work got underway in a very short period of time.



Like many homeowners, Wendell and Julie opted to stay in their home during construction. And although it was trying at times with all the commotion and noise, they managed to survive it. At particularly noisy times, especially during the demolition and framing stages, Julie took refuge at her nearby mother's home.

And while things were happening in a hurry, one thing

Wendell and Julie didn't have to worry about was rude or unseemly behavior from the various work crews. According to Julie and Wendell, everyone was very respectful of the family, their living space, and their hours.

"They tried to be conscious of when they started in the morning as well as quitting time at the end of the day.





There were days when they needed to start early and to their credit, they would set up pretty quietly until 7:30 or so, when they knew we would all be up and about."

And as disruptive as it was to live through a project of this scope, the homeowners will tell you that it was well worth it. The additional bedrooms (they actually gained three) as well as the expanded family space more than makes up for the short period of discomfort they experienced.















Looking out into the addition, the photo on the left was taken from what was the home's original living room. In addition to the open space that was created, the expansion allowed for the original space to be re-purposed. Note the spacious new closet space on the left.

In addition to the very much needed expanded space, the project also gave the homeowners the opportunity to re-evaluate their mechanical systems. After careful analysis, Wendell, who coincidentally works in the HVAC industry, opted for a geothermal heat pump system. Although the upfront costs were higher, the energy savings over the years is expected to pay for the system over and over again. Tapping the constant temperature of the earth, energy use for the home's heating, cooling, and hot water is estimated to be trimmed as much as 80% while providing yearround comfort.

And speaking of comfort, Wendell and Julie opted to heat their new addition with radiant floor heat which uses hot-water tubes underneath the flooring. Such systems are very quiet and don't use dust-spewing ductwork. What's more, because radiant floor heating is constant, it is extremely comfortable while also very energy efficient.

Supplementing the energy savings of the new geothermal system, the homeowners also invested heavily in upgraded insulation—going for as much R-value as possible—in the exterior walls as well as the roof for both the new as well as the original portions of the home.

Feedback from family and friends has been very positive. According to Wendell, "They definitely like it. It's great to finally have the space for us to get together as a family and also entertain. As for the neighbors who saw it all happening, they can't believe it. They didn't think it could be done—especially in the time frame that we had to do it."







With the expansion and the re-purposing of space within the original home, three additional bedrooms were gained.

The two oldest girls, who previously shared a bedroom, now have their own with a bathroom in between. While the previous arrangement worked fine, Mom and Dad are pleased to provide them their own personal space to organize things and to express themselves.







homeowner ADVICE

from homeowners

FINANCING. For anyone who's thinking of doing a project, make sure you have financing in place...and be sure to leave some wiggle room. No matter how well you plan, there are always a few things that'll come up that'll end up costing a little more than expected. Rather then skimp, you'll want to do it right and those costs will add up. Instead of budgeting every dollar the bank offers, keep some in reserve for the unexpected. And unlike new construction, a renovation to an existing property will have it's share of unexpecteds. Plan on it.

NEW HOME vs. ADDING ON. For us, I think what we did was a good decision. You can look at it two ways—if we had moved to another home, it would've been at least \$250,000 for the space we needed. And over the next few years, we would probably spend another \$100,000 or so in upgrades just to maintain it ... new roof, new heating, remodeling a kitchen, etc. Instead, our investment in the addition and the upgrades that

we made to the original home, especially in terms of energy efficiency, has put us in a much better position—now as well as down the road.

EXPECTATIONS. Be realistic. Realize that construction is going to take some time—it won't happen quickly. Your neighbors might think your project is moving quickly but it certainly won't seem that way to you. Having said that, I should also point out that the discomfort we experienced during the 3-4 months of construction was well worth it—very much so!

will be your most important decision. Make sure you trust them. In our case, we had full confidence in LHC and their team. We knew we could trust them in every aspect of their work and that things would be done correctly with no corners cut. And they didn't disappoint us—these guys are extremely conscientious, very professional, and take great pride in their work. We couldn't be more pleased with them and how beautifully they transformed and enhanced our home.

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
