ccording to the homeowners Lynne and Jeff, their purchase of this property was on a whim. Having lived for years down the street, they noticed that the property was going up for auction. While the property itself was very appealing, the old dilapidated farmhouse was a major eyesore. Built in the 1820's, the stone farmhouse had been uninhabited for over 20 years. Windows no longer existed and the prolonged exposure to the elements deteriorated the interior framing to such a degree that the second and third floors were deemed unsafe.

And yet, despite the condition of the farmhouse, Lynne and Jeff saw potential and decided to participate in the auction. Another motivating factor, if not the primary reason for their interest, was the fact that for years the couple was renting farm space to house a wide-assortment of farm animals (see Editor's Note on the right). Once part of a traveling petting zoo that Lynne operated, the animals were now retired. With the property's existing barn and fenced barnyard, the property they were bidding on would be ideal for the animals and would eliminate the need for renting space. And having the animals onsite would eliminate the daily hassle of traveling to tend to them.

As though it were meant to be, the couple landed the property and proceeded with their plans to make it their home. And although consideration was given to raze the farmhouse and start from scratch, that thought was quickly dismissed. According to Lynne, "Despite its poor condition, we saw great potential...we had to do this. And, as it turned out, we thank God everyday for blessing us with our beautiful new farmhouse."





First Floor









To get a better feel for the project and what all was included, here's a brief description.

The Original Stone Home

The entire interior of the original home was gutted followed by a complete rebuild of the home from the basement to the second floor. That rebuild included framing, flooring, walls, ceilings, doors, windows, electric wiring, plumbing, as well as heat and air conditioning. As seen on the plan drawings on the previous page spread, the first floor consists of a sitting room, an office, a large hallway, and a powder room. As seen in interior photos that follow, much of the first floor's back stone wall was repaired and repointed and exposed from both inside the original home and the new addition. Consistent with homes of that period, the stone walls are approximately two feet thick.




On the second floor of the original stone home are two bedrooms, a full bath, and laundry.

The exterior work on the original home included extensive repair and repointing of the stone walls as well as a new concrete-based, covered front porch. A new roof was installed on the rebuilt home at the same time it was installed on the addition.



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The Addition

From an outside view, the addition consists of everything that has siding (rather than stone). The only exception is the side entryway (as seen on the previous page) which has a stucco surface. In addition to the side entry, outside access to the addition can be made through the new mudroom (used primarily by the family) as well as directly into the new great/family room via French doors.

A spacious cathedral-ceiling foyer extends from the side entry and leads into the original stone home where a window previously existed. The new opening was made possible by a steel beam

that was covered with reclaimed vintage lumber (see top photo on page 35). In fact, reinforcement steel beams were used in all the doorway openings connecting the stone home to the addition as well as the wood-shelved window opening as seen on pages 33 and 34. In addition, a reinforcement beam was used in the kitchen/dining area. In all cases, the first floor steel beams were covered with reclaimed lumber to help tie the addition into the stone home.

In addition to the side entry hallway and the mudroom, the addition includes an open-space kitchen/dining area and the large, cathedral-ceiling family room on the first floor. Upstairs, the addition includes a master suite (bedroom, walk-in closet,




